Dear Senator Feinstein:

We are writing to you as national organization dedicated to consumer protection issues, particularly issues regarding children. We write to thank you for your leadership in offering your amendment to S. 2663, the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) Reform Act and to extend our support for this amendment that would help reduce infant injuries and deaths due to unsafe secondhand cribs.

This amendment would apply Consumer Product Safety standards to the commercial use or sale of dangerous *secondhand* cribs in order to protect infants. It is critical that the definition of "commercial users" include hotels and motels and that hotels and motels are stopped from providing unsafe cribs for use by unsuspecting consumers. It is also vital that the definition of commercial user include childcare facilities and family childcare homes to protect children as broadly as possible.

This amendment is so important because currently, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission's (CPSC) mandatory standards and industry's voluntary standards apply only to *new* cribs sold on the market; they do not apply to the sale or commercial use of secondhand cribs. Most crib-related injuries and deaths occur in secondhand cribs. According to the most recent data from CPSC, every year, approximately 32 children die from injuries sustained in cribs and more than 11,300 children require hospital treatment for crib-related injuries.¹ The CPSC has estimated that the cost to society from deaths due to cribs is at least \$150 million per year.

Many of our colleagues have worked toward the successful passage of state laws in Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Illinois, Louisiana, Michigan, New Jersey, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, and Washington that make it illegal to manufacture or sell a crib that does not meet current safety standards. We have witnessed excellent results due to these laws. Therefore, we strongly believe that children in every state deserve this basic protection.
